

Lavrentiev-prox-regularization for optimal control of PDEs with state constraints

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Abstract. A Lavrentiev prox-regularization method for optimal control problems with pointwise state constraints is introduced where both the objective function and the constraints are regularized. The convergence of the controls generated by the iterative Lavrentiev prox-regularization algorithm is studied. For a sequence of regularization parameters that converges to zero, strong convergence of the generated control sequence to the optimal control is proved. Due to the prox-character of the proposed regularization, the feasibility of the iterates for a given parameter can be improved compared with the non-prox Lavrentiev-Regularization.

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1 Introduction

In the applications modelled by optimal control problems, pointwise state constraints are important since often, practical considerations require certain restrictions on the state. Unfortunately, for problems of pde-constrained optimal control with state constraints, in general the corresponding multipliers are not contained in a function space but only given as measures (see [1]). In order to obtain regular multipliers, the Lavrentiev regularization has been introduced, that transforms the pure state constraint to a mixed state-control constraint. This method is studied for example in [5, 7, 8, 9, 11] and in the references cited

there. We do not claim to give a complete list of references about this subject here but want to mention in particular the paper [12], where problems of optimal boundary control are studied and the references therein. Due to the regularization, for the regularized auxiliary problems that are control problems with mixed pointwise control-state constraints multipliers with L^2 -regularity exist, see [13].

In the (non-prox) Lavrentiev regularization there is a single real-valued regularization parameter $\lambda > 0$. For each parameter λ , an auxiliary problem with a mixed state-control constraint is defined. To obtain convergence, this Lavrentiev regularization parameter λ must converge to $0+$. However, as λ decreases the problems become more and more difficult to solve. For each fixed $\lambda > 0$ in general the generated controls are infeasible for the original problem.

In this paper we introduce a Lavrentiev prox-regularization method where for a given parameter value λ , the feasibility is improved. In our regularization apart from the real-valued regularization parameter λ a control function appears as a second regularization parameter in the state constraints. If the zero control is chosen, the non-prox Lavrentiev regularization is obtained. During the algorithm, this control parameter is updated iteratively. Moreover, in our method also a regularization parameter $\epsilon \geq 0$ appears in the objective function in the same way as in the classical prox-regularization algorithm (see for example [10, 4]). We show that for a sequence of regularization parameters (λ_k, ϵ_k) converging to zero, the new algorithm where the control regularization parameter is updated iteratively generates a sequence of controls that converges with respect to the L^2 -norm to the optimal control.

We start by considering the elliptic optimal control problem with pointwise state constraints and pointwise control constraints (section 2) and the corresponding Lavrentiev prox-regularization (section 3). Then we turn to the elliptic optimal control problem with pointwise state constraints only (section 4) and the Lavrentiev prox-regularization (section 5) for this problem.

At the end of the paper we present examples where we compare the convergence of the Lavrentiev prox-regularization method with the non-prox Lavrentiev regularization. We give two numerical examples where the Lavrentiev prox iteration converges faster than the non-prox Lavrentiev regularization.

2 The Elliptic Problem with pointwise control constraints

In this section we introduce an elliptic optimal control problem with state constraints and L^∞ -control constraints.

Let $N \in \{2, 3, 4, \dots\}$ and $\Omega \subset R^N$ be a bounded domain with $C^{0,1}$ boundary Γ . Let a desired state $y_d \in L^\infty(\Omega)$ be given. Let a real number $\kappa > 0$ be given. Define the objective function

$$J(y, u) = \frac{1}{2} \int_{\Omega} (y - y_d)^2 dx + \frac{\kappa}{2} \int_{\Omega} u(x)^2 dx.$$

In addition, let control bounds $u_a, u_b \in L^\infty(\Omega)$ be given such that $u_a \leq u_b$ on Ω . Let state bounds $y_a, y_b \in L^\infty(\Omega)$ be given such that $y_a < y_b$ almost everywhere on Ω . Let ∂_n denote the normal derivative with respect to the outward unit normal vector. As in [2], let A an elliptic differential operator of the form

$$Ay = - \sum_{i,j=1}^N \partial_{x_j} [a_{ij} \partial_{x_i} y] + a_0 y$$

where the coefficients a_{ij} belong to $C(\overline{\Omega})$ and satisfy the inequality

$$m \|\xi\|^2 \leq \sum_{i,j=1}^N a_{ij}(x) \xi_i \xi_j \leq M \|\xi\|^2$$

for all $\xi \in R^N$ and for all $x \in \Omega$ for some $M > 0, m > 0$ and $a_0 \in L^r(\Omega)$ is not identically zero with $r \geq Np/(N + p)$ for some fixed $p > N, a_0 \geq 0$ in Ω .

Define the following elliptic optimal control problem with distributed control, pointwise state constraints and pointwise control constraints:

$$\mathbf{Q} \left\{ \begin{array}{l} \text{minimize } J(y, u) \text{ subject to} \\ \partial_n y = 0 \text{ in } \Gamma \\ Ay = u \text{ in } \Omega \\ y_a \leq y \leq y_b \text{ in } \Omega \\ u_a \leq u \leq u_b \text{ in } \Omega. \end{array} \right. \quad (1)$$

Note that for a solution u_* of \mathbf{Q} , we have $u_* \in L^\infty(\Omega)$.

As in [5], the notation G is used for the control to state map that gives the state y as a function of the control $u, G: L^2(\Omega) \rightarrow H^1(\Omega)$. The notation S is

used for the control to state map as an operator $L^2(\Omega) \rightarrow L^2(\Omega)$ which is the composition of G and the suitable embedding operator.

3 Lavrentiev Prox Regularization

For $u \in L^2(\Omega)$ define $K(u) = J(G(u), u)$. Let the Lavrentiev regularization parameter $\lambda > 0$ and the prox-regularization parameter $\varepsilon \geq 0$ and $v \in L^\infty(\Omega)$ be given. We consider the regularized problem

$$\mathbf{Q}_{\lambda, \varepsilon, v} \begin{cases} \text{minimize } K(u) + \frac{\varepsilon}{2} \int_{\Omega} (u - v)^2 dx & \text{subject to} \\ y_a \leq \lambda(u - v) + G(u) \leq y_b & \text{in } \Omega \\ u_a \leq u \leq u_b & \text{in } \Omega. \end{cases} \quad (2)$$

Let v_* denote the optimal value of \mathbf{Q} , and $v(\lambda, \varepsilon, v)$ denote the optimal value of $\mathbf{Q}_{\lambda, \varepsilon, v}$. Let F_* denote the admissible set of \mathbf{Q} and $F(\lambda, \varepsilon, v)$ denote the admissible set of $\mathbf{Q}_{\lambda, \varepsilon, v}$.

If $v \in F_*$ is a solution of $\mathbf{Q}_{\lambda, \varepsilon, v}$ then

$$v_* \leq K(v) = v(\lambda, \varepsilon, v).$$

Moreover, if u_* is the solution of \mathbf{Q} we have

$$v_* = K(u_*) \geq v(\lambda, \varepsilon, u_*).$$

We consider the following

Lavrentiev Prox-Regularization Algorithm:

- Start:** CHOOSE $u_1 \in L^\infty(\Omega)$ AND $\lambda_1 > 0$ AND $\varepsilon_1 \geq 0$.
Step k : GIVEN $u_k \in L^\infty(\Omega)$ AND $\lambda_k > 0$ AND $\varepsilon_k \geq 0$, SOLVE $\mathbf{Q}_{\lambda_k, \varepsilon_k, u_k}$.
 DEFINE u_{k+1} AS THE SOLUTION OF $\mathbf{Q}_{\lambda_k, \varepsilon_k, u_k}$.
 CHOOSE $\lambda_{k+1} \in (0, \lambda_k]$, $\varepsilon_{k+1} \in [0, \varepsilon_k]$.
 GO TO STEP $k + 1$.

For the convenience of the reader, we also describe the (non-prox) Lavrentiev regularization algorithm that has been considered in the literature for example in [5, 7, 8, 9, 11]:

(non-prox) Lavrentiev Regularization Algorithm:

- Start:** CHOOSE $\lambda_1 > 0$.
- Step k :** GIVEN $\lambda_k > 0$, SOLVE $\mathbf{Q}_{\lambda_k, 0, 0}$.
 CHOOSE $\lambda_{k+1} \in (0, \lambda_k]$.
 GO TO STEP $k + 1$.

3.1 Uniform boundedness of the feasible sets of $\mathbf{Q}_{\lambda, \varepsilon, u}$

Due to the pointwise control constraints, the feasible points of $\mathbf{Q}_{\lambda, \varepsilon, u}$ are uniformly bounded in $L^\infty(\Omega)$:

Lemma 3.1. *Let $u \in F(\lambda, \varepsilon, v)$ be a feasible point of $\mathbf{Q}_{\lambda, \varepsilon, v}$. Then*

$$\|u\|_{L^\infty(\Omega)} \leq \max\{\|u_a\|_{L^\infty(\Omega)}, \|u_b\|_{L^\infty(\Omega)}\}.$$

3.2 Well-definedness and convergence of the generated sequence

In this section we study the convergence of the solutions $(u_k)_k$ for $k \rightarrow \infty$.

Theorem 3.2. *Assume that there exists a Slater control $\bar{\eta} \in L^\infty(\Omega)$ and $\bar{\varepsilon} > 0$ such that*

$$\begin{aligned} u_a &\leq \bar{\eta} \leq u_b, \\ y_a + \bar{\varepsilon} &\leq G(\bar{\eta}) \leq y_b - \bar{\varepsilon} \text{ almost everywhere on } \bar{\Omega}. \end{aligned}$$

Define $M = \max\{\|u_a\|_{L^\infty(\Omega)}, \|u_b\|_{L^\infty(\Omega)}\}$. Let $p \in (0, 1)$. Assume that in each step, λ_k is chosen such that $\lambda_k \leq 1$ and $\lambda_k^{1-p} \leq \bar{\varepsilon}/(2M)$. Then \mathbf{Q} has a solution, the Lavrentiev prox-regularization algorithm is well-defined, and if $\lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} \lambda_k = 0$ and $\lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} \varepsilon_k = 0$ we have

$$\lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} \|u_k - u_*\|_{L^2(\Omega)} = 0. \tag{3}$$

Moreover, there exists a constant $C_{10} > 0$ such that for all k

$$|v(\lambda_k, \varepsilon_k, u_k) - v_*| \leq C_{10} \lambda_k^p + o(\varepsilon_k). \tag{4}$$

For a real number z we use the notation $z_+ = (z + |z|)/2$. Hence we have $z_+ = \max\{z, 0\}$. For the constraint violation we have the upper bound

$$\begin{aligned} & \| (G(u_{k+1}) - y_b)_+ \|_{L^2(\Omega)} + \| (y_a - G(u_{k+1}))_+ \|_{L^2(\Omega)} \\ & \leq \lambda_k \| u_{k+1} - u_k \|_{L^2(\Omega)} = o(\lambda_k). \end{aligned}$$

Proof. First we show the existence of a solution of \mathbf{Q} . Since $\bar{\eta}$ is feasible for \mathbf{Q} , we have $v_* < \infty$. Let $(m_k)_k$ denote of minimizing sequence for \mathbf{Q} , that is the points $m_k \in L^2(\Omega)$ are feasible for \mathbf{Q} and $\lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} K(m_k) = v_*$. Since the sequence $(m_k)_k$ is bounded in $L^\infty(\Omega)$, we can choose a subsequence that converges weakly* in $L^\infty(\Omega)$ to a limit point $\bar{u} \in L^\infty(\Omega)$. Then this subsequence converges also weakly in $L^2(\Omega)$ to \bar{u} . Since the subsequence converges weakly in $L^2(\Omega)$, we have $v_* = \liminf_{k \rightarrow \infty} K(m_k) \geq K(\bar{u})$. Moreover, the weak* convergence in $L^\infty(\Omega)$ implies that \bar{u} is feasible for \mathbf{Q} . Hence \bar{u} is a solution of \mathbf{Q} . Due to the strong convexity of the objective function, this solution is uniquely determined.

Now we consider the sequence (u_k) generated by the Lavrentiev prox-regularization algorithm. Due to the control constraints, this sequence is bounded. Choose $p \in (0, 1)$. Define $\tau_k = \lambda_k^p$ and the function $v_k = (1 - \tau_k)u_* + \tau_k\bar{\eta}$ where u_* denotes the solution of \mathbf{Q} . Then $u_a \leq v_k \leq u_b$ and we have

$$\begin{aligned} G(v_k) + \lambda_k(v_k - u_k) &= (1 - \tau_k)G(u_*) + \tau_k G(\bar{\eta}) \\ &+ \lambda_k((1 - \tau_k)(u_* - u_k) + \tau_k(\bar{\eta} - u_k)) \\ &\leq (1 - \tau_k)y_b + \tau_k(y_b - \bar{\epsilon}) \\ &+ (1 - \tau_k)\lambda_k 2M + \tau_k \lambda_k 2M \\ &\leq y_b - \tau_k \bar{\epsilon} + \lambda_k 2M \\ &\leq y_b - \lambda_k^p \bar{\epsilon} + \bar{\epsilon} \lambda_k^p = y_b. \end{aligned}$$

On the other hand, we have $G(v_k) + \lambda_k(v_k - u_k) \geq y_a$. Hence $v_k \in F(\lambda_k, \varepsilon_k, u_k)$. This implies that the iteration is well defined.

Now we assume that the sequences $(\lambda_k)_k$ and $(\varepsilon_k)_k$ converge to zero. Then we have $\tau_k \rightarrow 0$ and thus $\lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} \|v_k - u_*\|_{L^\infty(\Omega)} = 0$. Thus we have

$$\begin{aligned} \limsup_{k \rightarrow \infty} v(\lambda_k, \varepsilon_k, u_k) &\leq \limsup_{k \rightarrow \infty} K(v_k) + (\varepsilon_k/2) \|v_k - u_k\|_{L^2(\Omega)}^2 \\ &= K(u_*) = v_*. \end{aligned}$$

Let $\tilde{u} \in L^\infty(\Omega)$ denote a weak* limit point of the sequence $(u_k)_k$. Then $\tilde{u} \in F_*$ and we have

$$K(\tilde{u}) \leq \liminf_{k \rightarrow \infty} v(\lambda_k, \varepsilon_k, u_k) \leq v_*$$

Since $\tilde{u} \in F_*$, the uniqueness of the solution of **Q** implies $\tilde{u} = u_*$. Hence the sequence $(u_k)_k$ converges weakly* to u_* . This implies the equation

$$\begin{aligned} \lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} (\kappa/2) \|u_k\|_{L^2(\Omega)}^2 &= \lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} K(u_k) - (1/2) \|S(u_k) - y_d\|_{L^2(\Omega)}^2 \\ &\quad - (\varepsilon_k/2) \|u_k - u_{k-1}\|_{L^2(\Omega)}^2 \\ &= K(u_*) - (1/2) \|S(u_*) - y_d\|_{L^2(\Omega)}^2 - 0 \\ &= (\kappa/2) \|u_*\|_{L^2(\Omega)}^2. \end{aligned}$$

Note that the convergence of $(\|u_k\|_{L^2(\Omega)})_k$ to $\|u_*\|_{L^2(\Omega)}$ is also an immediate consequence of the compactness of the solution operator S and the weak convergence of u_k to u_* with respect to the $L^2(\Omega)$ topology.

The weak convergence of u_k to u_* in $L^2(\Omega)$ and the convergence of the norms imply $\lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} \|u_k - u_*\|_{L^2(\Omega)} = 0$.

There exists a Lipschitz constant $C > 0$ such that for all points $v_1, v_2 \in L^\infty(\Omega)$ with $\|v_1\|_{L^\infty(\Omega)} \leq M$ and $\|v_2\|_{L^\infty(\Omega)} \leq M$, respectively we have $K(v_1) \leq K(v_2) + C\|v_2 - v_1\|_{L^2(\Omega)}$. Hence we have

$$\begin{aligned} v(\lambda_k, \varepsilon_k, u_k) &= K(u_{k+1}) + (\varepsilon_k/2) \|u_{k+1} - u_k\|_{L^2(\Omega)}^2 \\ &\leq K(v_k) + (\varepsilon_k/2) \|v_k - u_k\|_{L^2(\Omega)}^2 \\ &\leq K(u_*) + C\|v_k - u_*\|_{L^2(\Omega)} + (\varepsilon_k/2) \|v_k - u_k\|_{L^2(\Omega)}^2 \\ &\leq v_* + C\tau_k (\|u_*\|_{L^2(\Omega)} + \|\bar{\eta}\|_{L^2(\Omega)}) \\ &\quad + (\varepsilon_k/2) (\|v_k - u_*\|_{L^2(\Omega)} + \|u_k - u_*\|_{L^2(\Omega)})^2 \\ &\leq v_* + \lambda_k^p \sqrt{\mu(\Omega)} 2MC + o(\varepsilon_k) \end{aligned}$$

where $\mu(\Omega) = \int_\Omega 1 \, dx$. For all $k > 1$, the point $\tilde{u}_{k+1} = (1 - \tau_k)u_{k+1} + \tau_k\bar{\eta}$ is in F_* . Hence

$$\begin{aligned} v_* &\leq K(\tilde{u}_{k+1}) \\ &\leq K(u_{k+1}) + C\|\tilde{u}_{k+1} - u_{k+1}\|_{L^2(\Omega)} + (\varepsilon_k/2) \|u_{k+1} - u_k\|_{L^2(\Omega)}^2 \\ &\leq v(\lambda_k, \varepsilon_k, u_k) + C\tau_k (\|u_{k+1}\|_{L^2(\Omega)} + \|\bar{\eta}\|_{L^2(\Omega)}) \\ &\leq v(\lambda_k, \varepsilon_k, u_k) + C\lambda_k^p \sqrt{\mu(\Omega)} 2M. \end{aligned}$$

Define $C_{10} = 2MC\sqrt{\mu(\Omega)}$. Then (4) follows.

To obtain the bound for the constraint violation we have used the fact that the lower and the upper state bound cannot be violated simultaneously, hence for all controls u the sets $M_1 = \{x \in \Omega : (G(u) - y_b)(x) \geq 0\}$ and $M_2 = \{x \in \Omega : (y_a - G(u))(x) \geq 0\}$ are disjoint. On the set M_1 we have $(G(u_{k+1}) - y_b)_+ \leq \lambda_k |u_{k+1} - u_k|$ and on the set M_2 we have $(y_a - G(u_{k+1}))_+ \leq \lambda_k |u_{k+1} - u_k|$. Since $M_1 \cup M_2 \subset \Omega$ the assertion follows by integration. \square

Remark 3.3. Note that we have the inequality

$$\begin{aligned} v_* - K(u_{k+1}) &\leq v_* - K(\tilde{u}_{k+1}) + C\|\tilde{u}_{k+1} - u_{k+1}\|_{L^2(\Omega)} \\ &\leq 0 + C\|\tilde{u}_{k+1} - u_{k+1}\|_{L^2(\Omega)} \\ &\leq 0 + C\tau_k(\|u_{k+1}\|_{L^2(\Omega)} + \|\bar{\eta}\|_{L^2(\Omega)}) \\ &\leq C\lambda_k^p\sqrt{\mu(\Omega)}2M. \end{aligned}$$

where the prox-parameter ε does not appear explicitly. Hence for the optimal value we have the upper bound

$$v_* \leq K(u_{k+1}) + C\lambda_k^p\sqrt{\mu(\Omega)}2M.$$

4 The Elliptic Problem without pointwise control constraints

In this section we introduce an elliptic optimal control problem with state constraints. Here no $L^\infty(\Omega)$ -control constraints are present.

Let $N \in \{2, 3\}$ and $\Omega \subset R^N$ be a bounded domain with $C^{0,1}$ boundary Γ . Let a desired state $y_d \in L^\infty(\Omega)$ be given. Let a real number $\kappa > 0$ be given. Define the objective functions $J(y, u)$ and $K(u)$ as above. Let state bounds $y_a, y_b \in L^\infty(\Omega)$ be given.

Define the following elliptic optimal control problem with distributed control and pointwise state constraints

$$\mathbf{P} \begin{cases} \text{minimize } J(y, u) \text{ subject to} \\ \partial_n y = 0 \text{ in } \Gamma \\ Ay = u \text{ in } \Omega \\ y_a \leq y \leq y_b \text{ in } \Omega. \end{cases} \tag{5}$$

As in [5], the notation G is used for the control to state map that gives the state as a function of the control, $G : L^2(\Omega) \rightarrow H^1(\Omega) \cap L^\infty(\Omega)$. The notation S is used for the control to state map as an operator $L^2(\Omega) \rightarrow L^2(\Omega)$ which is the composition of G and the suitable embedding operator.

5 Lavrentiev Prox Regularization

Let the Lavrentiev prox-regularization parameters $\lambda > 0, \epsilon \geq 0$ and $v \in L^\infty(\Omega)$ be given.

We consider the regularized problem

$$\mathbf{P}_{\lambda, \epsilon, v} \begin{cases} \text{minimize } K(u) + \frac{\epsilon}{2} \int_{\Omega} (u - v)^2 dx & \text{subject to} \\ y_a \leq \lambda(u - v) + G(u) \leq y_b & \text{in } \Omega. \end{cases} \quad (6)$$

Let ω_* denote the optimal value of \mathbf{P} , and $\omega(\lambda, \epsilon, v)$ denote the optimal value of $\mathbf{P}_{\lambda, \epsilon, v}$. Let F_* denote the admissible set of \mathbf{P} and $F(\lambda, \epsilon, v)$ denote the admissible set of $\mathbf{P}_{\lambda, \epsilon, v}$.

Concerning the regularity of the multipliers corresponding to the inequality constraints in $\mathbf{P}_{\lambda, \epsilon, v}$, we can apply Theorem 2.1 in [5] that states that we find multipliers in the function space $L^2(\Omega)$.

We consider the following

Lavrentiev Prox-Regularization Algorithm:

- Start:** CHOOSE $u_1 \in L^\infty(\Omega)$ AND $\lambda_1 > 0$ AND $\epsilon_1 \geq 0$.
- Step k :** GIVEN $u_k \in L^\infty(\Omega), \lambda_k > 0$ AND $\epsilon_k \geq 0$, SOLVE $\mathbf{P}_{\lambda_k, \epsilon_k, u_k}$.
 DEFINE u_{k+1} AS THE SOLUTION OF $\mathbf{P}_{\lambda_k, \epsilon_k, u_k}$.
 CHOOSE $\lambda_{k+1} \in (0, \lambda_k]$ AND $\epsilon_{k+1} \in [0, \epsilon_k]$.
 GO TO STEP $k + 1$.

As far as the regularization of the objective function is concerned, this algorithm is related to the prox-regularization as considered in [10, 4]. The difference is that for our state-constrained problem regularization terms appear both in the constraints and in the objective function.

In our discussion we use the choice $u_1 = 0$. First we show that the iteration is well-defined. For $u_1 = 0$ problem $\mathbf{P}_{\lambda_1, \epsilon_1, u_1}$ is of the form studied in the papers

about Lavrentiev regularization [9, 7, 6], hence the corresponding existence results are applicable. As in Section 3, the non-prox Lavrentiev-Regularization corresponds to the definition of the regularization parameters $u_{k+1} = 0, \epsilon_{k+1} = 0$ for all $k \geq 0$, that is the non-prox Lavrentiev-Regularization is the algorithm: In step k solve $\mathbf{P}_{\lambda_k, 0, 0}$.

In step k , the function u_{k+1} satisfies the state constraint

$$y_a \leq \lambda_k(u_{k+1} - u_k) + G(u_{k+1}) \leq y_b \text{ in } \Omega.$$

Hence $u_{k+1} \in L^\infty(\Omega)$ and the function

$$\tilde{u}_{k+1} = u_{k+1} + (\lambda_{k+1}I + S)^{-1}\lambda_k(u_{k+1} - u_k)$$

is feasible for $\mathbf{P}_{\lambda_{k+1}, \epsilon_{k+1}, u_{k+1}}$. Therefore the iteration is well-defined.

5.1 Properties of $\lambda I + S$.

The following Lemma states that $(\|\lambda(\lambda I + S)^{-1}\|)_{\lambda>0}$ is uniformly bounded. Moreover, the operators converge pointwise to the zero operator for $\lambda \rightarrow 0+$. We use this Lemma in Example 2.

Lemma 5.1. *Let $\|S\|$ denote the operator norm of S as a map from $L^2(\Omega)$ to $L^2(\Omega)$. For all $\lambda > 0$ we have the inequality*

$$\|(\lambda I + S)^{-1}\| \leq \frac{1}{\lambda}. \quad (7)$$

Let $u \in L^2(\Omega)$, $u \neq 0$ and let $\lambda_k > 0$ with $\lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} \lambda_k = 0$. Then

$$\lambda_k \|(\lambda_k I + S)^{-1}u\|_{L^2(\Omega)} < \|u\|_{L^2(\Omega)}, \quad \lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} \lambda_k \|(\lambda_k I + S)^{-1}u\|_{L^2(\Omega)} = 0.$$

Proof. See [5].

5.2 Boundedness of the generated sequence

The iteration of the Lavrentiev prox-regularization method generates a bounded sequence if the regularization parameters are chosen sufficiently small. This can be seen as follows:

Lemma 5.2. *Assume that there exists a Slater control $\bar{\eta} \in L^\infty(\Omega)$ and $\bar{\epsilon} > 0$ such that*

$$y_a + \bar{\epsilon} \leq G(\bar{\eta}) \leq y_b - \bar{\epsilon}$$

on Ω . Assume that in each step, λ_k is chosen such that

$$\lambda_k \|\bar{\eta} - u_k\|_{L^\infty(\Omega)} \leq \bar{\epsilon}. \quad (8)$$

Assume that in each step, ϵ_k is chosen such that the sequence

$$(\epsilon_k \|\bar{\eta} - u_k\|_{L^2(\Omega)})_k \quad (9)$$

is bounded. Then the sequence $(u_k)_k$ generated by the Lavrentiev Prox-Regularization Algorithm is bounded in $L^2(\Omega)$.

Remark 5.3. Note that the conditions (8) and (9) can easily be satisfied during the iteration by choosing λ_k and ϵ_k sufficiently small since the functions $\bar{\eta}$ and u_k are known.

Proof. For all k we have the inequalities

$$G(\bar{\eta}) + \lambda_k(\bar{\eta} - u_k) \leq y_b - \bar{\epsilon} + \bar{\epsilon} = y_b,$$

$$G(\bar{\eta}) + \lambda_k(\bar{\eta} - u_k) \geq y_a + \bar{\epsilon} - \bar{\epsilon} = y_a$$

hence $\bar{\eta} \in F(\lambda_k, \epsilon_k, u_k)$ which implies the inequality

$$\begin{aligned} \frac{\kappa}{2} \|u_{k+1}\|_{L^2(\Omega)}^2 &\leq K(u_{k+1}) + \frac{\epsilon_k}{2} \|u_k - u_{k+1}\|_{L^2(\Omega)}^2 \\ &\leq K(\bar{\eta}) + \frac{\epsilon_k}{2} \|u_k - \bar{\eta}\|_{L^2(\Omega)}^2 \end{aligned}$$

and the assertion follows due to the boundedness of the sequence in (9). \square

5.3 Convergence of the generated sequence

We study now the convergence of the sequence $(u_k)_k$ generated by the Lavrentiev Prox-Regularization Algorithm.

Theorem 5.4. *Assume that the solution u_* of \mathbf{P} is in $L^\infty(\Omega)$ and that there exists a Slater control $\bar{\eta} \in L^\infty(\Omega)$ and $\bar{\epsilon} > 0$ such that*

$$y_a + \bar{\epsilon} \leq G(\bar{\eta}) \leq y_b - \bar{\epsilon}$$

on Ω . Let $p \in (0, 1)$ be given. Assume that in each step, $\lambda_k \in (0, 1)$ is chosen such that

$$\lambda_k^{1-p} \|\bar{\eta} - u_k\|_{L^\infty(\Omega)} \leq \bar{\epsilon}, \tag{10}$$

$$\lambda_k^{1-p} \|u_* - u_k\|_{L^\infty(\Omega)} \leq \bar{\epsilon}. \tag{11}$$

Assume that in addition the sequence $(\epsilon_k \|\bar{\eta} - u_k\|_{L^2(\Omega)})_k$ is bounded.

If $\lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} \lambda_k = 0$ and $\lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} \epsilon_k = 0$ we have

$$\lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} \|u_k - u_*\|_{L^2(\Omega)} = 0. \tag{12}$$

For the constraint violation we have the upper bound

$$\begin{aligned} & \| (G(u_{k+1}) - y_b)_+ \|_{L^2(\Omega)} + \| (y_a - G(u_{k+1}))_+ \|_{L^2(\Omega)} \\ & \leq \lambda_k \|u_{k+1} - u_k\|_{L^2(\Omega)} = o(\lambda_k). \end{aligned}$$

Remark 5.5. Condition (10) can easily be satisfied during the iteration by choosing λ_k sufficiently small since the functions $\bar{\eta}$ and u_k are known. Condition (11) can be satisfied if an *a priori* bound for $\|u_*\|_{L^\infty(\Omega)}$ is known. For the problem with additional pointwise control constraints, this problem does not occur, see section 2.

Lemma 5.4 states that if the λ_k and the ϵ_k decrease sufficiently fast we obtain convergence.

Proof. Since (10) holds and $\lambda_k < 1$, condition (8) also holds, hence since in addition condition (9) holds Lemma 5.2 implies that the sequence $(\|u_k\|_{L^2(\Omega)})_k$ is bounded.

Let \tilde{u} denote a weak limit point in $L^2(\Omega)$ of the sequence $(u_k)_k$. Then $\tilde{u} \in F_*$. Moreover, we have the inequality

$$\omega_* \leq K(\tilde{u}) \leq \liminf_{k \rightarrow \infty} \omega(\lambda_k, \epsilon_k, u_k).$$

Define $\tau_k = \lambda_k^p$ and the function $v_k = (1 - \tau_k)u_* + \tau_k\bar{\eta}$. Then we have

$$\begin{aligned} G(v_k) + \lambda_k(v_k - u_k) &= (1 - \tau_k)G(u_*) + \tau_k G(\bar{\eta}) \\ &\quad + \lambda_k((1 - \tau_k)(u_* - u_k) + \tau_k(\bar{\eta} - u_k)) \\ &\leq (1 - \tau_k)y_b + \tau_k(y_b - \bar{\epsilon}) \\ &\quad + \lambda_k \left[(1 - \tau_k)\lambda_k^{p-1}\bar{\epsilon} + \tau_k\lambda_k^{p-1}\bar{\epsilon} \right] \\ &= y_b - \lambda_k^p\bar{\epsilon} + \lambda_k\lambda_k^{p-1}\bar{\epsilon} \\ &= y_b. \end{aligned}$$

On the other hand, we have

$$\begin{aligned} G(v_k) + \lambda_k(v_k - u_k) &= (1 - \tau_k)G(u_*) + \tau_k G(\bar{\eta}) \\ &\quad + \lambda_k((1 - \tau_k)(u_* - u_k) + \tau_k(\bar{\eta} - u_k)) \\ &\geq (1 - \tau_k)y_a + \tau_k(y_a + \bar{\epsilon}) \\ &\quad - \lambda_k \left[(1 - \tau_k)\lambda_k^{p-1}\bar{\epsilon} + \tau_k\lambda_k^{p-1}\bar{\epsilon} \right] \\ &= y_a + \lambda_k^p\bar{\epsilon} - \lambda_k\lambda_k^{p-1}\bar{\epsilon} \\ &= y_a. \end{aligned}$$

Hence $v_k \in F(\lambda_k, \epsilon_k, u_k)$. Moreover, $\lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} \|v_k - u_*\|_{L^\infty(\Omega)} = 0$. Thus we have

$$\begin{aligned} \limsup_{k \rightarrow \infty} \omega(\lambda_k, \epsilon_k, u_k) &\leq \limsup_{k \rightarrow \infty} K(v_k) \\ &= K(u_*) = \omega_*. \end{aligned}$$

Hence we have $\lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} \omega(\lambda_k, \epsilon_k, u_k) = \omega_*$. This implies that $K(\tilde{u}) = \omega_*$. Since $\tilde{u} \in F_*$, the uniqueness of the solution of **P** implies $\tilde{u} = u_*$. Hence the sequence $(u_k)_k$ converges weakly to u_* .

As in the proof of Theorem 3.2 we obtain (12).

For all k we have the inequalities

$$\begin{aligned} G(u_{k+1}) - y_b &\leq \lambda_k(u_k - u_{k+1}) \\ y_a - G(u_{k+1}) &\leq \lambda_k(u_{k+1} - u_k). \end{aligned}$$

This implies the L^2 -bound for the constraint violation

$$\begin{aligned} & \| (G(u_{k+1}) - y_b)_+ \|_{L^2(\Omega)} + \| (y_a - G(u_{k+1}))_+ \|_{L^2(\Omega)} \\ & \leq \lambda_k \| u_{k+1} - u_k \|_{L^2(\Omega)}. \end{aligned} \tag{13}$$

□

In Theorem 5.4 we have stated that $b_k = \lambda_k \| u_{k+1} - u_k \|_{L^2(\Omega)}$ is a bound for the constraint violation. In the non-prox Lavrentiev-Regularization (In step k solve $\mathbf{P}_{\lambda_k, 0, 0}$) we have the corresponding bound $t_k = \lambda_k \| u_{k+1} \|_{L^2(\Omega)}$ that satisfies the inequality

$$\| (G(u_{k+1}) - y_b)_+ \|_{L^2(\Omega)} + \| (y_a - G(u_{k+1}))_+ \|_{L^2(\Omega)} \leq t_k. \tag{14}$$

If $u_* \neq 0$ and $\| u_k - u_* \|_{L^2(\Omega)} \rightarrow 0$ we have the inequality

$$\lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} \frac{t_k}{\lambda_k} = \| u_* \|_{L^2(\Omega)} > 0 = \lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} \frac{b_k}{\lambda_k} \tag{15}$$

which indicates that at least asymptotically, the Lavrentiev prox-regularization method yields smaller bounds for constraint violation.

6 Examples

In this section we study two examples that allow to compare the performance of the Lavrentiev prox-regularization method and the non-prox Lavrentiev regularization method.

Example 1. Consider a problem \mathbf{P} , where for the optimal control we have $u_* \in L^\infty(\Omega)$ and both inequality constraints are *not* active, that is we have $y_a < G(u_*) < y_b$ in the sense that

$$\text{ess inf}_\Omega (y_a - G(u_*)) > 0, \quad \text{ess inf}_\Omega (G(u_*) - y_b) > 0.$$

In this case, u_* is an unconstrained local minimal point of K and the convexity of K implies that $\omega_* = K(u_*) = \min_{u \in L^2(\Omega)} K(u)$. Let $v \in L^2(\Omega)$ be given. Since $F(\lambda, \epsilon, v) \subset L^2(\Omega)$, for all $\lambda > 0$ we have the inequality

$$\omega(\lambda, \epsilon, v) = \min_{u \in F(\lambda, \epsilon, v)} K(u) \geq \min_{u \in L^2(\Omega)} K(u) = K(u_*).$$

Since $u_* \in F(\lambda, \epsilon, u^*)$ we have $\omega(\lambda, \epsilon, u_*) \leq K(u_*) = \omega_*$, hence in this case $\omega(\lambda, \epsilon, u_*) = \omega_*$. Thus with the choice $u_1 = u_*$, the Lavrentiev prox-regularization method generates the constant sequence $u_k = u_*$ for all k and all $\lambda_k > 0, \epsilon_k > 0$, even if the sequences $(\lambda_k)_k, (\epsilon_k)_k$ do not converge to zero.

More generally, we have $u_* \in F(\lambda_k, \epsilon_k, u_k)$ if

$$\lambda_k \leq \min \left\{ \frac{\text{ess inf}_\Omega (y_a - G(u_*))}{\|u_k - u_*\|_{L^\infty(\Omega)}}, \frac{\text{ess inf}_\Omega (G(u_*) - y_b)}{\|u_k - u_*\|_{L^\infty(\Omega)}} \right\}.$$

In this case

$$\omega_* \leq \omega(\lambda_k, \epsilon_k, u_k) \leq K(u_*) + (\epsilon_k/2)\|u_k - u_*\|^2 = \omega_* + (\epsilon_k/2)\|u_k - u_*\|^2.$$

If $\epsilon_k = 0$, this yields $\omega_* = \omega(\lambda_k, \epsilon_k, u_k)$, hence in this case u_k solves $\mathbf{P}_{\lambda_k, \epsilon_k, u_k}$. If $\epsilon_k > 0$, the method reduces to a classical prox regularization for problem \mathbf{P} , where the constraints are not regularized. For the non-prox Lavrentiev regularization method, u_* is the solution with the parameter λ_k if $u_* \in F(\lambda_k, 0, 0)$ which is the case if

$$\lambda_k \leq \min \left\{ \frac{\text{ess inf}_\Omega (y_a - G(u_*))}{\|u_*\|_{L^\infty(\Omega)}}, \frac{\text{ess inf}_\Omega (G(u_*) - y_b)}{\|u_*\|_{L^\infty(\Omega)}} \right\}.$$

If $\|u_* - u_k\|_{L^\infty(\Omega)} < \|u_*\|_{L^\infty(\Omega)}$ and $\epsilon_k = 0$, the Lavrentiev prox-regularization method can find u_* with larger parameter values λ_k than the non-prox Lavrentiev regularization.

Example 2. Consider a problem \mathbf{P} , where for the solution both inequality constraints are active almost everywhere in Ω , that is we have $y_a = G(u_*) = y_b$ and the Slater condition is violated. Assume that $y_a \in C^2(\Omega)$ satisfies the boundary conditions $\partial_n y_a = 0$ in Γ . In this case, we have $S(u_*) = y_a$.

The non-prox Lavrentiev regularization method computes the solution u_{k+1}^{NP} of $\mathbf{P}_{\lambda_k, 0, 0}$ for which we have the following equation: $(\lambda_k I + G)u_{k+1}^{NP} = y_a$. Hence $(\lambda_k I + S)(u_{k+1}^{NP} - u_*) = y_a - \lambda_k u_* - y_a = -\lambda_k u_*$.

This yields

$$u_{k+1}^{NP} - u_* = -\lambda_k (\lambda_k I + S)^{-1} u_*,$$

hence if $\lambda_k \rightarrow 0$ due to Lemma 5.1 we have

$$\lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} \|u_{k+1}^{NP} - u_*\|_{L^2(\Omega)} = \lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} \|\lambda_k (\lambda_k I + S)^{-1} u_*\|_{L^2(\Omega)} = 0.$$

The Lavrentiev prox-regularization method computes the solution u_{k+1} of $\mathbf{P}_{\lambda_k, \epsilon_k, u_k}$ for which we have the following equation: $(\lambda_k I + G)u_{k+1} - \lambda_k u_k = y_a$.

Hence we have $(\lambda_k I + S)(u_{k+1} - u_*) = y_a + \lambda_k u_k - \lambda_k u_* - y_a = \lambda_k (u_k - u_*)$.

Thus if $u_k \neq u_*$ we have due to Lemma 5.1

$$\|u_{k+1} - u_*\|_{L^2(\Omega)} = \|\lambda_k (\lambda_k I + S)^{-1} (u_k - u_*)\|_{L^2(\Omega)} < \|u_k - u_*\|_{L^2(\Omega)}$$

(see the proof of Lemma 5.1) hence the algorithm generates a bounded sequence with strictly decreasing distance to u_* also if $(\lambda_k)_k$ does *not* converge to zero.

We have $(\lambda_k I + S)(u_{k+1} - u_*) - \lambda_k u_k = -\lambda_k u_*$, hence if $\lambda_k \rightarrow 0$ we have

$$\lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} \|[u_{k+1} - \lambda_k (\lambda_k I + S)^{-1} u_k] - u_*\|_{L^2(\Omega)} = \lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} \|\lambda_k (\lambda_k I + S)^{-1} u_*\|_{L^2(\Omega)} = 0.$$

Example 3. Let $\kappa = 0$, $A = -\Delta y + y$, $y_d \equiv 1$ and $J(y, u) = (1/2) \int_{\Omega} (y - 1)^2 dx$. Choose $y_a = 0$, $y_b = 1$. Then the optimal control that solves \mathbf{P} is $u_* \equiv 1$ and we have $\omega_* = 0$.

For all $\lambda > 0$ we have the inequality

$$S(u_*) + \lambda u_* = 1 + \lambda > y_b,$$

hence u_* is infeasible for the auxiliary problem $P(\lambda, 0, 0)$ used in the Lavrentiev regularization method. However, $\tilde{u}_\lambda = 1/(1 + \lambda)$ is in $F(\lambda, 0, 0)$ hence we have the inequality

$$\omega_* = 0 \leq \omega(\lambda, 0, 0) \leq K(\tilde{u}_\lambda) = \frac{\mu(\Omega)}{2} \frac{\lambda^2}{(1 + \lambda)^2}.$$

For every $v \in L^\infty(\Omega)$ with $1 \leq v \leq \frac{1+\lambda}{\lambda}$ on Ω we have the inequality

$$y_a = 0 \leq S(u_*) + \lambda(u_* - v) = 1 + \lambda(1 - v) \leq y_b$$

hence u_* is feasible for $P(\lambda, \epsilon, v)$ and we have the inequality

$$\omega_* = 0 \leq \omega(\lambda, \epsilon, v) \leq \frac{\epsilon}{2} \|1 - v\|_{L^2(\Omega)}^2.$$

So if $1 \leq u_1 \leq \frac{1+\lambda}{\lambda}$ with the choice $\epsilon = 0$, the Lavrentiev prox regularization algorithm finds the optimal control u_* in one step. For $\epsilon > 0$ with a fixed parameter λ , we can make the regularization error arbitrarily small by choosing ϵ sufficiently small.

Example 4. Let $\Omega = [0, \pi] \times [0, \pi]$. Define the desired state

$$y_d(x_1, x_2) = 1 - \cos(x_2).$$

Consider the problem

$$\mathbf{P} \begin{cases} \min \frac{1}{2} \int_{\Omega} (y - y_d)^2 & \text{s.t.} \\ -\Delta y + y = u & \text{on } \Omega \\ \partial_n y = 0 & \text{on } \Gamma \\ -10 \leq y \leq 1 - \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} & \text{on } \Omega. \end{cases}$$

The state constraint $y \leq 1 - \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2}$ implies that for $x_2 \geq \pi/6$ we have

$$y_d - y \geq 1 - \cos(x_2) - \left(1 - \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2}\right) = \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} - \cos(x_2) = \left|\frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} - \cos(x_2)\right|.$$

This yields the optimal state

$$y_*(x_1, x_2) = \begin{cases} y_d(x_1, x_2) & \text{if } x_2 \leq \pi/6, \\ 1 - \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} & \text{if } x_2 > \pi/6. \end{cases}$$

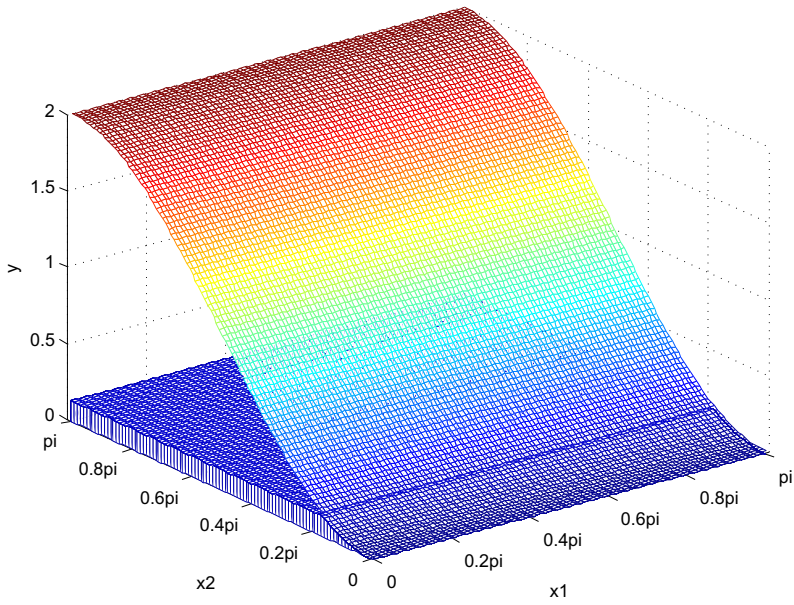


Figure 1 – The desired state y_d and the optimal state y_* .

Figure 1 shows the desired state y_d and the optimal state y_* that is generated by the optimal control

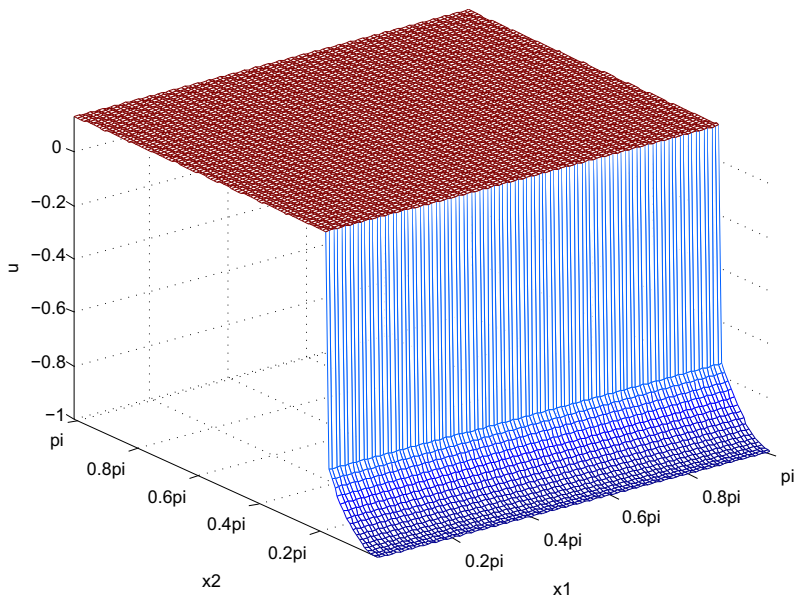


Figure 2 – The optimal control u_* .

$$u_*(x_1, x_2) = \begin{cases} 1 - 2 \cos(x_2) & \text{if } x_2 \leq \pi/6, \\ 1 - \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} & \text{if } x_2 > \pi/6. \end{cases}$$

shown in Figure 2.

The optimal control u_* has a jump discontinuity at $x_2 = \pi/6$. The optimal value ω_* of \mathbf{P} is given by the equation

$$\begin{aligned} \omega_* &= \frac{\pi}{2} \int_{\pi/6}^{\pi} \left(y_d - \left(1 - \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2}\right) \right)^2 ds \\ &= \frac{\pi^2}{2} \left(\frac{25}{24} + \frac{3\sqrt{3}}{8\pi} \right) \\ &= \frac{\pi^2}{2} 1.2484150\dots \end{aligned}$$

We use a discretization based upon Fourier-expansions. In the general case, this corresponds to a representation of the control as a series of eigenfunctions of the operator A . Here we write the control function u as a cosine series of the form

$$u(x_1, x_2) = \sum_{j=0}^{\infty} \beta_j \cos(j x_2).$$

Then

$$\int_{\Omega} u^2 = \pi^2 \beta_0^2 + \frac{\pi^2}{2} \sum_{j=1}^{\infty} \beta_j^2$$

and we obtain the following series representation for the state:

$$y(x_1, x_2) = \sum_{j=0}^{\infty} \frac{1}{1+j^2} \beta_j \cos(j x_2).$$

Hence we have

$$y - y_d = (\beta_0 - 1) + \left(\frac{\beta_1}{2} + 1\right) \cos(x_2) + \sum_{j=2}^{\infty} \frac{1}{1+j^2} \beta_j \cos(j x_2).$$

For the objective function, this yields

$$\begin{aligned} \frac{1}{2} \int_{\Omega} (y - y_d)^2 &= \frac{\pi^2}{2} \left((\beta_0 - 1)^2 + \frac{1}{2} \left(\frac{\beta_1}{2} + 1\right)^2 + \frac{1}{2} \sum_{j=2}^{\infty} \frac{\beta_j^2}{(1+j^2)^2} \right) \\ &=: F(\beta). \end{aligned}$$

So we see that for $v = \sum_{j=0}^{\infty} \gamma_j \cos(j x_2)$ the problem $\mathbf{P}_{\lambda, \varepsilon, v}$ is equivalent to the problem

$$\begin{aligned} \min_{\beta \in l^2} F(\beta) + \frac{\varepsilon}{2} \left(\pi^2 (\beta_0 - \gamma_0)^2 + \frac{\pi^2}{2} \sum_{j=1}^{\infty} (\beta_j - \gamma_j)^2 \right) \text{ s.t.} \quad (16) \\ -10 \leq \sum_{j=0}^{\infty} \left\{ \left(\frac{1}{1+j^2} + \lambda \right) \beta_j - \lambda \gamma_j \right\} \cos(j x_2) \leq 1 - \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2}, \quad x_2 \in [0, \pi]. \end{aligned}$$

By replacing the infinite series by a finite sum we obtain a semi-infinite optimization problem with a quadratic objective function and linear constraints.

In our numerical implementation we used the finite sums $\sum_{j=0}^{75}$ and a finite number of inequality constraints corresponding to the 1001 grid points $0.001\pi j$ for $j \in \{0, \dots, 1000\}$. We solved the finite-dimensional optimization problems with the program `fmincon` from the matlab optimization toolbox.

Let $u_1 = 0$ and let $\omega(\lambda)$ denote the optimal value of $\mathbf{P}_{\lambda,0,u_1}$ which is used in the non-prox Lavrentiev regularization.

Table 1 contains the optimal values of the discretized problems for various values of λ . The state error e_y has been computed as

$$e_y = (0.001\pi)^2 \sum_{i,j=0}^{1000} (y_c(x_{ij}) - y_*(x_{ij}))^2 \quad (17)$$

with the computed state y_c and the grid points x_{ij} .

Table 1 – Results as a function of the Lavrentiev-regularization parameter λ with $u_1 = 0$ (non-prox Lavrentiev regularization).

The constraint violation e_v has been computed as

$$e_v = (0.001\pi)^2 \sum_{i,j=0}^{1000} [(y_c(x_{ij}) - y_*(x_{ij}))_+]^2. \quad (18)$$

Starting with $u_1 = 0$, we have computed the Lavrentiev-prox regularization iterates with $\lambda_k = 10 * 10^{(1-k)/2}$. Let ω_k denote the optimal value of $\mathbf{P}_{\lambda_k, 0, u_k}$ which is used in the Lavrentiev prox iteration. Table 2 shows the results.

In this case the Lavrentiev-prox regularization iterates shown in Table 2 converge faster than the iterates generated with the non-prox Lavrentiev regularization shown in Table 1.

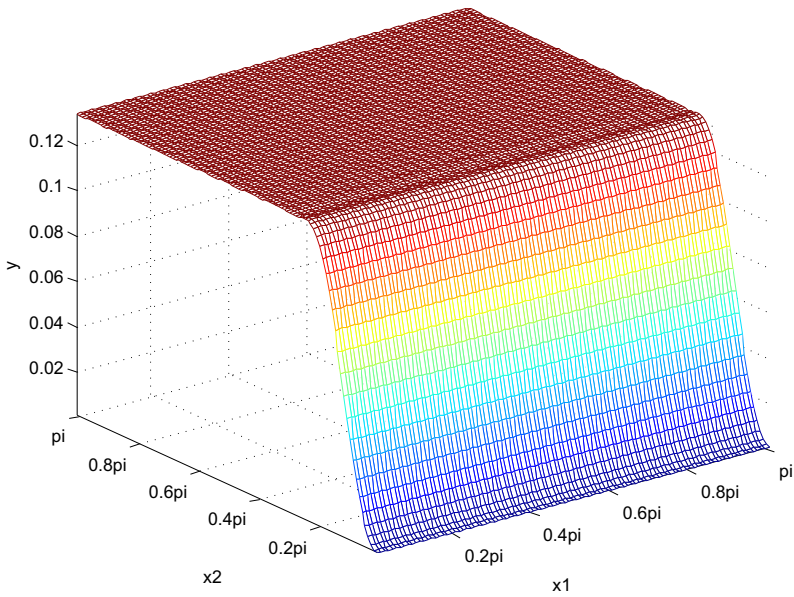


Figure 3 – The computed state y_{11} .

Figure 3 shows the optimal state y_{11} that is computed in step 11 of the Lavrentiev-prox iteration with $\lambda_{11} = 10^{-4}$.

Example 5. As in Example 4 let $\Omega = [0, \pi] \times [0, \pi]$ and define the desired state $y_d(x_1, x_2) = 1 - \cos(x_2)$.

Consider the problem

$$\mathbf{P} \left\{ \begin{array}{ll} \min \frac{1}{2} \int_{\Omega} (y - y_d)^2 & \text{s.t.} \\ -\Delta y + y = u & \text{on } \Omega \\ \partial_n y = 0 & \text{on } \Gamma \\ -10 \leq y \leq 1 & \text{on } \Omega. \end{array} \right.$$

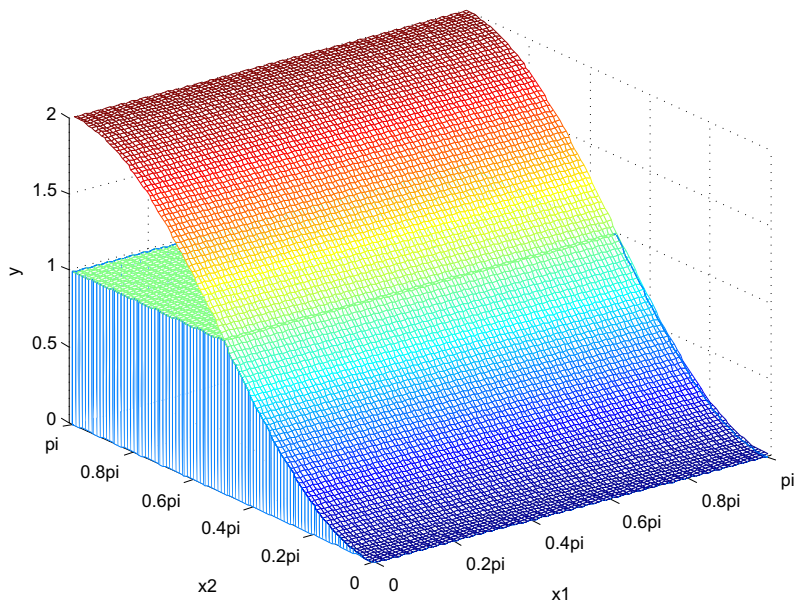


Figure 4 – The desired state y_d and the optimal state y_* .

The state constraint $y \leq 1$ implies that for $x_2 \geq \pi/2$ we have

$$y_d - y \geq 1 - \cos(x_2) - 1 = -\cos(x_2) = |\cos(x_2)|.$$

This yields the optimal state

$$y_*(x_1, x_2) = \begin{cases} y_d(x_1, x_2) & \text{if } x_2 \leq \pi/2, \\ 1 & \text{if } x_2 > \pi/2. \end{cases}$$

Figure 4 shows the desired state y_d and the optimal state y_* that is generated by the optimal control

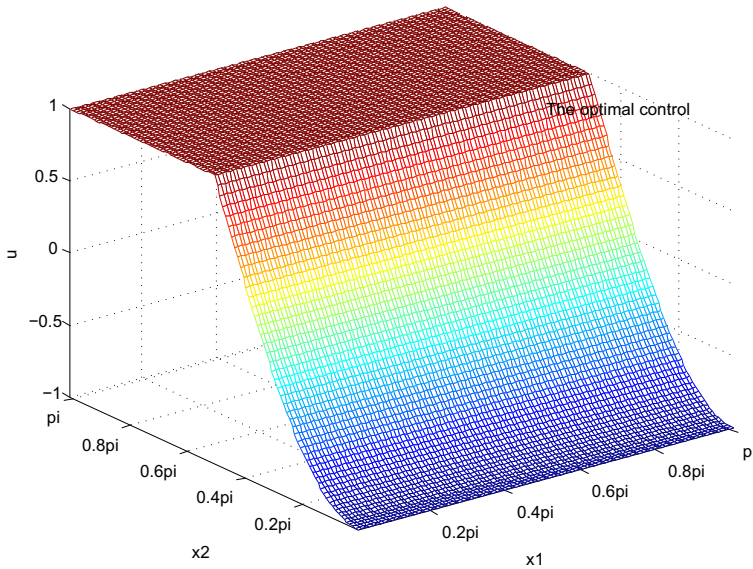


Figure 5 – The optimal control u_* .

$$u_*(x_1, x_2) = \begin{cases} 1 - 2 \cos(x_2) & \text{if } x_2 \leq \pi/2, \\ 1 & \text{if } x_2 > \pi/2. \end{cases}$$

shown in Figure 5. The optimal control u_* is continuous. The optimal value ω_* of \mathbf{P} is given by the equation

$$\omega_* = \frac{\pi}{2} \int_{\pi/2}^{\pi} (y_d - 1)^2 ds = \frac{\pi^2}{2} \int_{\pi/2}^{\pi} \cos^2(s) ds = \frac{\pi^2}{2} 0.25.$$

As in Example 4, we use a discretization based upon Fourier-expansions. For $v = \sum_{j=0}^{\infty} \gamma_j \cos(j x_2)$ the problem $\mathbf{P}_{\lambda, \varepsilon, v}$ is equivalent to the problem

$$\min_{\beta \in l^2} F(\beta) + \frac{\varepsilon}{2} \left(\pi^2 (\beta_0 - \gamma_0)^2 + \frac{\pi^2}{2} \sum_{j=1}^{\infty} (\beta_j - \gamma_j)^2 \right) \text{ s.t.} \quad (19)$$

$$-10 \leq \sum_{j=0}^{\infty} \left\{ \left(\frac{1}{1+j^2} + \lambda \right) \beta_j - \lambda \gamma_j \right\} \cos(j x_2) \leq 1, \quad x_2 \in [0, \pi].$$

By replacing the infinite series by a finite sum we obtain a semi-infinite optimization problem with a quadratic objective function and linear constraints. Again in our numerical implementation we used the finite sums $\sum_{j=0}^{75}$ and a finite number of inequality constraints corresponding to the 1001 grid points $0.001\pi j$ for $j \in \{0, \dots, 1000\}$. Again we used the program `fmincon` from the matlab optimization toolbox to solve the finite-dimensional optimization problems.

Let $u_1 = 0$ and let $\omega(\lambda)$ denote the optimal value of $\mathbf{P}_{\lambda, 0, u_1}$ which is used in the non-prox Lavrentiev regularization. Table 3 contains the results for the solution of the discretized problems for various values of λ . The state error e_y has been

computed as in (17) and the constraint violation e_v has been computed as in (18).

Starting with $u_1 = 0$, we have computed the Lavrentiev-prox regularization iterates with $\lambda_k = 10 * 10^{(1-k)/2}$. Let ω_k denote the optimal value of $\mathbf{P}_{\lambda_k, 0, u_k}$ which is used in the Lavrentiev prox iteration. Table 4 shows the results.

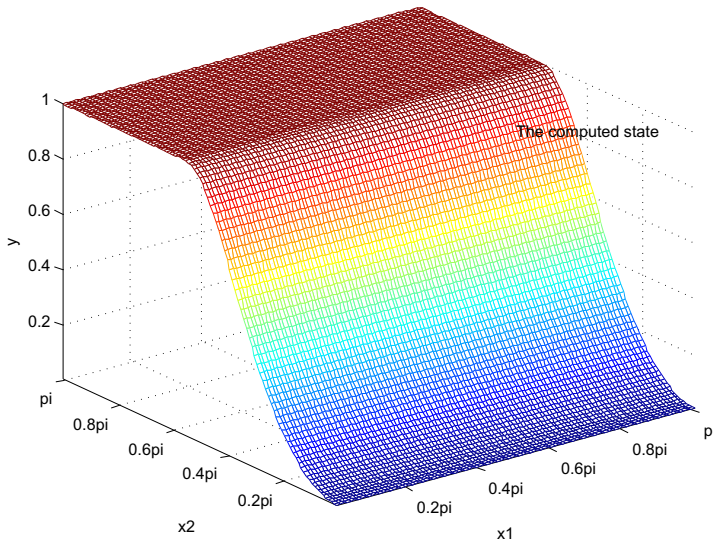


Figure 6 – The computed state y_{11} .

Figure 6 shows the optimal state y_{11} that is computed in step 11 of the Lavrentiev-prox iteration with $\lambda_{11} = 10^{-4}$.

In this example the Lavrentiev-prox regularization iterates shown in Table 4 converge faster than the iterates generated with the non-prox Lavrentiev regularization shown in Table 3.

7 Conclusion

In this paper we have introduced the Lavrentiev prox-regularization method for elliptic optimal control problems. The cost for the solution of the parametric auxiliary problems in each step of the method is the same as for the non-prox Lavrentiev regularization method since the auxiliary problems are of exactly the same form. Hence also the same numerical methods can be used for the solution, for example primal-dual active set methods, interior point methods or semismooth Newton methods, see [5, 6, 8, 11]. Our numerical examples indicate

that the Lavrentiev prox-iteration gives approximations of the same quality as the non-prox Lavrentiev regularization method in fewer steps and with larger regularization parameters. We have also applied the method successfully for the solution of optimal control problems with hyperbolic systems see [3].

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
